I think she was correct once when she said that "those kids got out of school to come here" as some elementary children talked to their relative on a bench. 

Recently a request came to our office via Una Coogan, IBVM webmaster, to Chris, to me and eventually to Kevin and Betty in Archives. A woman in Alaska found a 7 Sorrows Rosary in an antique shop in her town. A tag on

it read + Sr. Cassin. She researched nuns and found the name with the IBVMs, but had no more information. At lunch, Betty recognized the name as one of her grade school teachers, but she also found another Canadian IBVM by that name. This woman was delighted with what we could send her. I noticed that her email address included "sacred art" so I asked about it and recommended she look up Anawim Arts. She was delighted yet again! We ended up corresponding a few times about Ukraine, homelessness, aging religious communities and the world's need for prayer. We promised each other to pray. Who is my neighbor? How God is Working!

Recently I was donating at the blood bank and was attended by Chandra, the director. I noticed her Black History button and asked her what might be a good book on Black History for me to read. I didn't get that answer, but she told me about her family of foster and adopted children. One, a 17-year-old, was looking for information about her mom. Ancestry couldn't help her, but Chandra wanted some way to find out about Americans from Beliz, about migrations that took people to Beliz and from there to America. I texted Brenda in Rome, and a week later, Brenda responded with all she had learned about the migrations. Gratitude poured out from Chandra's heart. Who is my neighbor? How God is working!


